Pope seeks pardon for Catholics who wronged

VATICAN CITY (AP) - In an unprecedented moment in the history of the church, Pope John Paul II asked God's forgiveness Sunday for the sins of Roman Catholics through the ages, including wrongs inflicted on Jews, women and minorities.

The apology was a personal landmark for a frail, ailing pope who vowed to cleanse and reinvigorate Catholicism for its third millennium.

'We forgive and we ask forgiveness," he said at several points during the solemn Day of Pardon Mass at St. Peter's Basilica.

The church burned heretics at the stake during the Inquisition. Armies of the faithful slaughtered Muslims during the Crusades, and some Catholics stood silent in the face of Nazi genocide during the Holocaust.

The pontiff did not specifically mention such infamous wrongs during the service. Few specific groups were mentioned and no names were

Clinton continues to press for gun-safety legislation

WASHINGTON (AP) - Making the case for stricter gun safety laws, President Clinton suggested that measures included in legislation languishing on Capitol Hill could prevent tragedies such as the killing last week of a 6-year-old Michigan girl.

"I'm not at all sure that even a callous, irresponsible drug dealer with a 6-year-old in the house wouldn't leave a child trigger lock on a gun," Clinton said in an interview with CNN's "Burden of Proof," a transcript of which was released Thursday by the White House.

Clinton has stepped up pressure on Congress since the shooting of Kayla Rolland at a school in Mount Morris Township, Mich. She was killed by a first-grade classmate who had taken the gun from an adult living in the house of his uncle, where the child was staying.

The administration wants to require safety locks on new guns, ban the import of large-capacity ammunition clips and require a three-day waiting period for background checks before buying a weapon at gun shows.

Elvis impersonator sentenced for poaching

MADISON (AP) - A professional Elvis impersonator who concocted an elaborate deer poaching scheme has been sentenced to a month in jail.


Clyde H. Masten III, 24, poached a trophy buck in Columbia County in 1996 and attempted to make it appear he legally killed the deer in Michigan. But officials snared him by using an isotope analysis that proved the buck was from Wisconsin.

Masten, 24, was given the jail time and a \$2,000 fine by a U.S. District Court on Friday. Masten also was ordered to perform 1,000 hours of community service for unlawfully transporting wildlife across state

lines. Crocker delayed Masten's jail stay until April 17 to allow him to make a scheduled appearance as an Elvis Presley impersonator in Branson, Mo.

Women fall to Washington juggernaut in battle of undefeateds

ST. LOUIS — Coach Lisa Stone has plans to cut her hair now. She said in October that she wouldn't cut her hair until the women's basketball team lost.

The No. 2 Blugolds suffered their first lost of the season last Friday, losing to No. 1 ranked Washington University 81-63.

With the much anticipated match-up said and done, it might seem to have been a blow out.

Although the score tells one thing, anyone who was at the game will tell another. The 'Golds went up against the twotime defending national champion know-

STORM LAKE, Iowa — The absolute outpouring of emotion by the men's basketball team and the Eau Claire fan contingent Saturday night at Siebens Fieldhouse was the pinnacle of a two-day rollercoaster of emotions that earned the Blugolds a trip to the NCAA Division III Final Four on Friday and Saturday in Salem, Virginia.

"I put two things on the board tonight," coach Terry Gibbons said. "One was a poorly-designed artistic

rendition of a brain, and the other was a big heart.

"I told the guys we've gotta play smart, and we've gotta play with a lot of heart."

And that's exactly what they did, willing their way to a win over WIAC rival UW-Stevens Point 60-58 as the 'Golds star center and emotional leader, senior Jon Wallenfelsz, watched from behind the bench.

Though junior Sherm Carstensen hit game-winning three-point shot, Wallenfelsz was as much a part of the post-game frenzy as anyone else.

It was a race right down to the wire that easily could have gone either way.

Justin Hentges and Erin Brandt were elected as the president and vice president of Student Senate over the team of Colin Clark and Kelly Witkowski by 74 votes.

At the end of Wednesday, Hentges and Brandt led by only two votes, but got strong support on Thursday from votes in the Haas Fine Arts Center that gave them the

winning edge.

The close vote was not a surprise to either side.

Hentges and Brandt received 52 percent of the votes, while Clark and Witkowski got 48 percent.

 DAVIES REFERENDUM approved by wide margin; senators find turnout encouraging

The 44th session of the UW- Eau Claire Student Senate begins today as students newly-elected in last week's election take their seats for the first time.

The new senators were decided in the election that took place last week. There were 1,776 students who voted, an increase from the 1,327 students who voted in last year's election.

"I think that's great that more students were voting," Sen. Nicole Kittle said. "Maybe next year we can get even more."

Sen. Bridget Dillon agreed the increase was good, See VOTING, page 12

Along with the election of the senators, Justin Hentges and Erin Brandt defeated Colin Clark and Kelly Witkowski to become the new student body president and vice president. A mere 74 votes separated the two tickets. In addition to voting for student government, a ref-

erendum for Davies Center expansion was on the ballot. The referendum asked students if they would be in favor of up to a \$38 dollar increase in segregated fees to support an addition to Davies. The referendum passed by an overwhelming majority of about 76 percent of voters voting in favor of the increase.
